We the Registered Nurses of America declare the city of Detroit to be a Public Health Emergency Zone.

As United Nations experts have said, the shutoff of water is a violation of human rights.

This is not a natural disaster, which makes the shutoff of water especially immoral and unconscionable. Depriving Detroit residents of the water they need and deserve cannot be condoned under any circumstances in a civilized society.

Water is life sustaining. All living beings need water to live. Lack of water directly undermines the health and safety of Detroit residents, and their families.

For optimal health in our daily lives, we need clean water for drinking. Infants, children, and the elderly are particularly vulnerable; they are more susceptible to dehydration, infection, and disease without access to water.

We need clean water for cooking, including washing our food.

We need clean water for good hygiene, to bathe in, to wash our clothes, to flush our toilets, and to clean our living spaces.

We need clean water for proper sanitation to combat the growth and spread of multiple infectious diseases and pandemics.

We need clean water to grow healthy food, for traditional agriculture, but also those low-income families affected by the economic crisis in Detroit who have supplemented their diets and daily food supply with household gardens.

We need clean water for a safe and healthy environment, for all living animals and plants that are an essential component of a healthy ecosystem on which we all depend for human health.

As registered nurses, we are compelled to advocate for all our patients, whether at the bedside or in our neighborhoods and communities.

To that end, we, National Nurses United, on behalf of the nurses of America, declare a public health emergency in Detroit.

We demand an immediate end to all water shutoffs.

We demand an end to the disgraceful practice of city officials who have removed children from homes where water has been shutoff, an especially inhumane victimization of low-income families already harmed by a city with an appalling missense of priorities.

And, we demand the guarantee that all Detroit residents have immediate and full access to clean water.
